



The CCG is asking GPs and patients to consider if it is appropriate for the patient to buy the medicine themselves for a minor self-limiting condition (i.e. from a pharmacy) or to refer to Pharmacy First (the IOW CCG commissioned minor ailments service, which will enable them to obtain the medicine free of charge if they are eligible for free prescriptions).

We are not saying that no OTC medicines may be prescribed, as it may be appropriate for longer-term use and for vulnerable patients.

We really need you to use the minor ailment service to its full potential to support the resilience of the island's health service.

## We want all patients with any minor ailments to go to the Pharmacy First!

- Improves timely access to health care advice and medicines for minor ailments
- Reduces contact with general practices and frees up GP/A&E appointments
- Encourages patients to use the "Pharmacy First" for health advice next-time
- Supports patient self-care and self-management of their health and well-being

### **OTC Campaign key messages**

- Medications for the treatment of a range of minor, self-limiting (short-term) conditions such as a sore throat, indigestion or fungal infections can be bought directly from a pharmacy without the need for a GP appointment or prescription
- By going to your pharmacy for health advice, patients will get much quicker treatment for their illness and will also free up appointments for other people with more serious illnesses to be seen by a GP
- Buying 'over the counter' medication helps free up much needed funding within the health care budget for new interventions which will potentially have a significant impact on the quality of life for island residents e.g. continuous glucose monitors, or brand new medicines approved by NICE.

# We've updated the Pharmacy First service specification

- Pharmacy staff can provide the consultation under pharmacist supervision
- The patient does not need to be present e.g. child or older adult
- Use of a private consultation room is optional as appropriate
- Extended eligibility criteria now includes non-residents / visitors
- General practice referral card and posters to sign-post patients to the Pharmacy First
- Pharmacist Pharmacy First referral card for patients to take to the practice if the patient does need to see a clinician.



We have increased the range of medicines available on the Pharmacy First formulary. This means an extended range of minor ailments can be treated by the community pharmacy staff.

# Please encourage people to buy the medicines themselves wherever possible – almost half of service users say they would be happy to pay!

Please don't convert all pharmacy sales of OTC medicines to Pharmacy First (the budget won't stretch that far!). However, if the cost of the product is a problem for the patient, a Pharmacy First supply can be offered to prevent the patient going to the GP for a "free" prescription.

# **Eligibility criteria**

- Use when purchasing an OTC medicine would be an issue and non-supply would generate an unnecessary GP appointment.
- If the patient pays for their prescription they will pay the OTC cost of any medicines supplied.
- If people are willing to pay for a medicine then they should be encouraged to do so.
- Medication supplied will be free of charge ONLY if exempt from prescription charges.
- The service is available to Isle of Wight residents and UK visitors to the island
- The patient does not always need to be present in the pharmacy e.g. children or elderly

### **Onward Referral**

We want patients to be treated in the pharmacy whenever possible and appropriate. If the condition is not suitable for self-management, or the patient deteriorates, please ask them to contact you for further advice, call 111 to be triaged appropriately or contact the GP.

By promoting "Pharmacy First" together we can change patient behaviour to use the pharmacy first and not go to the GP for the treatment of minor self-limiting conditions (NHS England Guidance).

We are looking to renew the contract for Pharmacy First (and the other CCG commissioned community pharmacy services) from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020.
