Gemma MM Jones has a background in biology, gerontology, and nursing and a doctorate concerning the neuropsychology of Alzheimer's disease. She writes, lectures, teaches and consults – internationally - about dementia care, care environments and Alzheimer Cafés (AC).

With Dr. Bère Miesen, she co-edited the four volumes of *Care- giving in Dementia* – Routledge Pubs. (1992-2006), to contribute to the developing knowledge-base for dementia-care. She has over 100 publications and DVDs. Recent books: *'The Alzheimer Café: why it works'*, *2010; 'Vol. 1, TAD Newsletters - Thoughts About Dementia*- the first fifty', 2012; and, 'About dementia: for families with Children', 2016.

In 2000, she co-founded the first Alzheimer Café UK (AC) and is chair of the charity. She was a member of the workgroup for the Nuffield Council on Bioethics with produced the report - 'Dementia: ethical issues', 2009. As Director of The Wide Spectrum she develops dementia education materials. Her research interests include understanding how sensory and time-perception changes affect behavior and offer new ideas for bespoke care. She consults on the design of user-friendly dementia care environments.

Of the many courses she has developed and taught to professionals, caregivers and family carers, the best known is 'Communication and Care-giving in Dementia: a positive vision'. The one-day course, for anyone interested in dementia, "Lighting DARC - dementia awareness reaching communities", has been taught to over 1700 people and has resulted in police, fire officers and others attending and supporting Alzheimer Cafés.

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
